- 2. What might the *fisherman symbolize*? Explicate the symbolic meaning of this figure.
- 3. Compare/contrast the meaning of "grey" in this poem with its connotations in *Innisfree* and *Stolen Child*.
- 4. Explicate the *visionary aspects* of this poem, with reference to specific lines.
- 5. How/where does this poem fulfill the *desire for the two-in-one?* What two things are being merged in this poem?
- 6. Explicate the meaning of the *trout*, comparing its appearance here with similar images in other poems?
- 7. Can you think of films, books that celebrate fly fishing? Fishing in general?
- 8. Explicate the symbolic meaning of "dawn."
- 9. Record passages where Yeats is writing about poetry? Why does he feel such a strong sense of identity with the fisherman?
- 10. Explicate: "the living men that I hate."
- 11. What does Yeats *contrast* in this poem? What is the central *tension* in the poem?
- 12. How might the central theme of this poem be about Yeasts' vision for a new man, a new human child: what qualities define this new human? What flaws define his civilized counterpart?
