- 5. Comparative analysis: Develop a *comparison* with Muir's "Hetch Hetchy." Any similarity in rhetorical tropes used by both writers? Elements of style? Differences?
- 6. How does he *bring Ralph to life*? How does he describe him?
- 7. What other *literary*, *historical figures* does he evoke? Why them?
- 8. Cite an example of Abbey's use of the *epiphany*, or heightened moment, on the river.
- 9. Record an example of his describing the experience in spiritual; or religious terms?
- 10. What aspects of the experience cause him *anxiety*?

- 11. Record a passage where he *evokes the river*? What devices does he use bring it alive?
- 12. What *activities* characterize his interactions with Ralph?
- 13. What fantasies of *eco-activism* does he entertain?

- 14. How does he explicate the trope of the "wilderness" within the context of his critique of modernity?
- 15. How does Abbey's take on "paradise" differ from the typical, if not stereotypical take on it?
- 16. How does his critique include the role of the "Pioneer?"
- 17. What other writers does he evoke in the American nature writing tradition?

- 18. What reasons does he give for the anomaly that "life diminishes in quantity as you approach the Colorado River" (214, my text).
- 19. What fresh anxieties trouble his mind? What perils do they face?
